

Regulations and Scheme of Examinations (General Objectives, Scheme of Examinations and Courses of Study for Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies)

Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies has already been approved in Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar Chair. The offered courses are subject to change according to the Choice-Based-Credit-System (CBCS).

General Objectives:

The curriculum is designed to achieve the following general objectives of the Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies:

- The main objective of course is to understand, assess and disseminate ideas and thoughts of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar particularly on subjects like Economics, Political Science, Religion, Philosophy, Constitutional Studies, Education, Social Work, Human Rights as well as other disciplines considered relevant for attainment of our National Goal of Social Justice.
- To impart specialized knowledge and understanding about the Life and Socio political philosophy of B. R. Ambedkar.
- To understand the Indian society, Indiancaste system, untouchability, and Indian diversity with reference to B. R. Ambedkar.
- To develop critical thinking among students pertaining to Ambedkar's Writings and Speeches.
- To develop knowledge and understanding of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar role in making of Indian constitution.
- To deepen their knowledge and understanding of Ambedkar's works in context to modern times and analysis of contemporary issues with respect to philosophy of B. R. Ambedkar and to develop research capacities.

(2) Jour

Duration: The duration of the Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (spread over two semesters) shall be one academic year including project work. Candidates shall be permitted to complete the programme requirements of the one-year programme within a maximum period of three years from the date of admission to the programme. The summer / winter vacations should be used for field attachment and other activities. The candidate shall be required to attend 75% of the classes.

Eligibility for Admission:

A Bachelor's Degree in any Faculty of a University established by Law in India including Shastri & Vashist Shastri or any degree equivalent to Bachelor's degree.

OR

Degree of a Foreign University which may be recognized as an equivalent for the purpose by Vice- Chancellor.

Number of Seats: 40 (Forty), which can be varied as per rules in the University.

Faculty: Keeping in view multi-disciplinary nature of the course, the faculty will be invited guest teachers from concerned fields.

Evaluation:

The performance of a candidate in each course will be evaluated in terms of percentage of marks. Evaluation for each course shall be done by continuous comprehensive assessment (CCA) by the concerned course teacher and end session examination. It will be consolidated at the end of the course. The evaluation system of the students has the following two components: -

- A. Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA): accounting for 20% of the total marks assigned to a particular course.
- B. End-Semester Examination (ESE) accounting for the remaining 80% of the total marks assigned to a particular course.

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) inPost Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS):

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) will include the following components:

(a) Classroom Attendance

Each candidate will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures/ Tutorials. A candidate having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the End Semester Examination (ESE).



Classroom Attendance Incentive:

- Those having greater than 75% attendance (for those participating in cocurricular activities, 20% will be added to per cent attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows: -
- > 75% but ≤ 78% 1 mark
- > 79% but ≤82% 2 marks
- > 83% but ≤86% 3 marks
- > 87% but ≤90% 4 marks
- > 91% and Above 5 marks
- Remaining 15 marks of CCA component in each course will be awarded on the basis of theory assignments / sessional activities to be assigned by the concerned course teacher. The continuous comprehensive assessment (CCA) will have the following components:

End-Semester Examination:

The End Semester Examinations for Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS) candidates will be held at the end of the semester. The dates are to be notified by the Controller of Examinations. The remaining 80% of the final marks assigned to a Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS) candidate in a course will be on the basis of an end-semester examination (ESE) that will be for three hours duration. The end semester examination (ESE) will cover the whole syllabus of the course. The examination shall consist of five papers four shall be theory papers and fifth paper shall be Project work. Each paper will be of 6 credits and each paper will be of 100 marks maximum. The minimum number of marks required to pass the examination shall be 40% in each theory paper. The project work will be of 6 credits. The topic of the project will be related to critical evaluation of Ambedkar's works in context to modern times or analysis of contemporary issues with



respect to works and philosophy of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar. The candidate has to submit a project report after completion of the project. The project work will be of total hundred marks – 80 marks will be of project evaluation and 20 marks will be of viva-voce evaluation. The minimum pass mark will be 50 Per cent including internal evaluation and external viva-voce evaluation. The candidates have to pass separately in internal and external evaluation by securing 50 per cent marks in each. The supervisor of the candidate for the project work shall be teachers/ experts from interdisciplinary concerned fields.

Guidelines for paper setters

A set of question papers for the end- semester examination (ESE) will be got set by the Controller of Examinations, H. P. University, Shimla-5.

The question paper for the end-semester examination (ESE) (having 80 marks) will have the following pattern:

• The question paper for the ESE will have Six Sections A, B, C, D, E & F. Section A will be Compulsory of 20 marks consisting 10 objective type questions (in MCQ/True/False/Fill in blanks or such type) of 2 marks each covering whole of the syllabus. Section B, C, D, E and F will consist of two questions out of which the candidate will attempt one question. Each question will carry 12 marks.

Total Marks : (A + B + C + D + E + F) = 20 + 12 + 12 + 12 + 12 + 12 = 80 Marks

Medium of Instruction/Examination for Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS):

The medium of Instruction/ Examination for the Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS) shall be English or Hindi.

Conditions for Qualifying the Post Graduate Diploma in Ambedkar Studies (PGDAS)

Course:

The minimum number of total marks required to pass the examination shall be 45% marks in aggregate in all the papers. The candidate shall be required to attend 75% of the classes. The pass candidate shall be classified as under:-

First Division: those students who obtain 60% or more of the aggregate marks. A
candidate obtaining 75% or more of the aggregate marks shall be shown to have
passed the examination with distinction.



- Second Division: those students who obtain 50% or more marks but less than 60% of the aggregate marks.
- Third Division: all those students who pass the examination obtaining 45% or less than 50% marks out of the aggregate will be classified in third Division.

UNIT-II - B.R. Ambedkar's View on Indian Agriculture
